AMERICAN WITCHHAZEL

Hamamelis virginiana

Unique large shrub with interesting foliage and yellow flowers, which bloom in late fall following leaf drop. Fruit and seeds provide a food source for many wildlife species.

Benefits for Wildlife

Pollinated at night by owlet moths, who stay warm by shivering their muscles
Fruit eaten by grouse, pheasants, rabbits, beavers, foxes, deer, and black bears
Turkeys snack on the seeds

Host to 63 caterpillar species, including: (common names) Large Lace-Border; Definite Tussock Moth; Funerary Dagger Moth; Spiny Oak-Slug Moth; Hickory Tussock Moth; Polyphemus Moth; Whitemarked Tussock Moth; Anointed Sallow

Benefits for People

- Interesting foliage and flowers
- Leaves and bark used historically for teas, medicines, salves, etc.
