

BLACK GUM

Nyssa sylvatica

Attractive, slow-growing tree with waxy leaves. Beautiful blue berries and showy scarlet-colored fall foliage.

Benefits for Wildlife

- Flowers are a food source for bees
- Fruit is a great resource for fall migration
- Hollow trunks provide nesting habitat for bats, owls, and raccoons

Host to 28 caterpillar species, including: (common names) The Hebrew; Luna Moth; Spiny Oak-Slug Moth; Cecropia Silkmoth; Whitemarked Tussock Moth

Benefits for People

- Striking fall colors
- Tolerates urban growing conditions
- Traditionally, logs were cut and used to house honeybees
- Excellent native alternative to the invasive Callery pear

Sunlight Sun, part shade, shade

Soil Type Moist, tolerates poor drainage,

but can adapt to drier sites
