COMMON JUNIPER

Juniperus communis

Needled evergreen conifer that loves colder climates! Behaves like a low-spreading shrub but can grow tall in certain conditions. Its fall berries are excellent for wildlife—and gin!

Benefits for Wildlife

- Provides shade and cover for songbirds and small mammals
- Nesting habitat for Short-eared Owls
- Woodrats use the branches in their nests

Host to 41 caterpillar species, including:
(common names) Juniper Hairstreak; Imperial Moth; Whitemarked Tussock Moth; Evergreen Spanworm; Honey-comb Micro

Benefits for People

- Hardy - tolerant to poor soils, drought, cold, and pollution
- Versatile as a groundcover or a shrub
- Berries are used as the dominant flavoring in gin
