NEW JERSEY TEA

Ceanothus americanus

Also known as New Jersey Redroot. This durable and drought-tolerant plant produces bright white flowers that attract hummingbirds, butterflies, and bees. Use as a groundcover or a low hedge for the most difficult areas of your yard.

Benefits for Wildlife

- Attracts hummingbirds, butterflies, bees, wasps, flies, and beetles
- Turkeys and quail eat fruit
- · Browsed by rabbits and deer

Benefits for People

- During the Revolutionary War, dried leaves were used as a tea substitute and hence the name New Jersey tea
- Can be used as an effective groundcover or low hedge for dry rocky slopes and banks
