SILVERROD

Solidago bicolor

This long-blooming goldenrod species features white or pale yellow flowers on an elongated spike. Great addition to areas with poor, dry soil. Attractive to pollinators and birds. Drought and deer tolerant!

Benefits for Wildlife

- Provides late season nectar for pollinators such as bees and butterflies
- Supports many species of specialized bees
- Songbirds eat the seeds

Host to 124 caterpillar species, including: (common names) The Asteroid; Brown-hooded Owlet; Green Leuconycta; Wavy-lined Emerald

Benefits for People

- Unique color - the only native white goldenrod
- Drought, salt, and deer tolerant
